Mark your calendars: Sunday
June 16th will be a special worship
for UCN. It is our sacred duty to
bring to a conclusion a long and
inspiring ministry. In 1831 UCN had
its origin in a group of parishioners
from the Coventry Congregational
Church, now we say goodbye to the
community that gave us birth.

The Coventry Church hasn't been active in more than ten years so this doesn't come as a surprise. The church building now has a future as town property for special events and as a meeting hall so it's up to us as the local UCC to have the closing service to bring one era to a close and open another.

The service will be modeled on a celebration of life, as that is what

we will be doing. We'll begin at 9:30 at UCN to memorialize the decades of worship and service and then process over to the Coventry Church to say our final goodbyes at 10:30. All are welcome to join either or both pieces of this important service in the work of the wider church.

Snapshot of the Vermont Conference Meeting

- What is it that our church has and does, that the world needs?
- What is God already doing among us, and how can we joyfully join in?
- What do you love to do?
- How can you share that with others in God's name?

These are some of the questions we were asked to ponder at the Vermont Conference UCC Annual meeting the last weekend of April. Our keynote speaker was Rev. Rob Voyle from the Center for Appreciative Inquiry. He asked us to imagine our church life, not as a story of decline, scarcity, and tired duty, but rather as a joyful exploration of God's call. He encouraged us to make an

inventory of the abundance of gifts that we already possess. By shifting the focus, we can engage in mission and ministry in new ways, with a listening ear for the Holy Spirit.

The Conference Annual

Meeting is a time for worship,

sharing ideas and fellowship with folks from other churches, and doing the business of the Conference. There was a surplus in the Conference budget this year, due to some staff vacancies. The Conference ministry staff has been reduced from 2 and 3/4 conference ministers, to two full time ministers: Lynn Bujnak and Paul Sangree. Paul brings gifts in the areas of church vitality and mentoring of new pastors. Lynn gives overall leadership to the conference. She spoke of the courage of our clergy in addressing hard issues, of the welcome our churches give to all, and the inspiring range of our mission activities— spanning the gambit from local to global efforts. Did you know that 80% of the income used to keep the Conference going comes from local churches? Like the local church, the Conference has a modest endowment, and draws money each year to balance the budget. Our contributions are greatly appreciated. How is our money spent? The Vermont

Conference provides assistance with securing new pastors, sponsors church vitality events and Ministers' Convocation, authorizes ministers and disciplines them when needed, and serves as pastor to the pastors. Speaking as a former pastor, the Conference is a place for renewal and connection with other clergy, reminding us of why we do what we do, and where God is still speaking.

We'll be hearing more about Appreciative Inquiry and its potential to help our churches grow. I'll leave you with thanks for sending me to conference as your delegate, and a few last words for you to ponder, as they relate to the United Church of Newport.

Frame your goals and dreams positively. (It's impossible to achieve a negative goal)

Recognize the abundance that's already present in our life together.

BUILDING & GROUNDS

Lighting Update Project

This committee has felt the need to upgrade our present lighting system to an LED system. There are a total of over 250 individual lights in our building. They would be converted gradually, on a priority basis, as well as funding availability. Curently *Efficiency Vermont* has a rebate that helps keep the cost down. Each individual conversion cost between \$12 & \$50 per unit. Chuck Newton, one of our B&G members, has suggested a neat idea of "Buy a Bulb". Parishioners

would "take ownership" of lights and hopefully feel part of this project. As you know, this is a move for better lighting for all, and a much more economical effort at cost savings for the future. More information will be forthcoming.

Turn out was small but we got a lot done on some specific tasks. There is a good chance another date will be selected (after the Yard Sale) to complete the necessary outdoor work. Stay tuned.

COOKING WITH A.J.

"Cooking with A.J." is an awesome sixweek culinary learning experience. It is a collaborative effort by NEKLS's Newport Learning Center, the Division of Vocational Rehabilitation of the VT Department of Disabilities, Aging and

Independent Living, and NEKCA's Parent Child Center. Our course is generously hosted by the United Church of Newport where Chef A. J. Nommik and his understudies are chef'n it up in style.

The goal of this first segment (of two) is to introduce participants to budget home cooking. While trying out easy but yummy recipes, students are also getting certified as ServSafe food handlers. A second segment is planned for later in the year to give interested students a flavor of what Thank You! ~B&G it's like to work in a professional kitchen.

> Each week, participants peruse fliers from a local grocery store, see what's on sale, and decide on a menu for the following week. Under Chef A.J.'s tutelage, students learn to use knives safely, to follow recipes, and to appropriately handle food to prevent contamination. The industry recognized ServSafe certificate for food handlers is awarded to all students who pass the respective exam at the end of the course. The current group includes four VocRehab consumers and two High School Completion students. A third cohort will start their cooking adventures on April 1st.







FINANCIAL NEWS April 2019

The Finance Committee met on May 8.

A review of the Treasurer's Report showed first 4 months income of \$45,417 against expenses of \$55,630. \$10,000.00 has been transferred from the Trust Funds to cover the costs. The UCN Trust Funds did well in the first quarter with a net increase of \$15,631.71.

As we all know it was a long cold winter with lots of snow and ice making our winter expenses above budget. In the same note, our collections are below budget.
